**Ocean City Action**

First flounder of the year was caught in Ocean City by Keith Weber on Monday! Besides that, fishing was extremely slow this past Easter Weekend. It was cold and the water temperatures were running around 44 degrees. Only thing we heard of were some skates from the surf. Some anglers didn't even catch those. We heard flounder were biting better in Wachapreague, VA. As soon as the water temps rise a few more degrees we should see stripers, tautog, and more flounder inshore. Offshore, Captain Monty on the Morning Star had some big tautog catches this past week.

**Chesapeake Bay Action**

Anyone anxious to get in on a little catch and release fishing for striped bass has been hovering over the warm water discharge at the Calvert Cliffs Power Plant in hopes of taking on a striped bass by jigging. Most fishermen are using heavy soft plastic jigs up to 10" in length; while some are also using butterfly jigs. Boats typically slowly motor up to the bubbling discharge and drift in the warm water plume till they find themselves several hundred yards down current; then repeat the process. Others have been trolling along the edges of the shipping channels with large bucktails or parachutes in tandem or behind umbrella rigs. A few fish are being picked up now and then but most are reporting the action to be very slow. Water temperatures in the bay

are holding around 45-degrees on the surface at the moment.

The Susquehanna Flats area is beginning to attract the attention of striped bass catch and release fishermen this week and most are reporting slow fishing conditions. A few striped bass are being caught on lures in the shallower areas and some fish are being caught on menhaden or gizzard shad baits on circle hooks. Water temperatures in the area are holding around 46-degrees and most fishermen look for the action to pick up once water temperatures rise above 50-degrees.

Fishermen continue to mark the progress of the white perch spawning runs in the states tidal rivers and are starting to see the smaller male white perch showing up at the headwater areas; a sure sign the larger females are not far behind. The warmer weather that is predicted this week should kick these runs into high gear and fishermen should be ready with shad darts and grass shrimp.

**Virginia Beach Action**

After a long winter, anglers are embracing the transition into spring. And although another cold blast will slow up progress this week, next week's highs will peak in the seventies. This trend has many hoping we have turned the corner, and springtime is settling in.

Everyone is excited about the spring flounder debut. The bite is not on fire as of yet, but folks who are wetting hooks with flatfish on their agenda, are finding keeper-sized takers scattered about the lower Bay. Catches are improving along the Baltimore Channel, near buoy 36A, and along Back River Reef, with many fish pushing over the newly implemented 16-inch minimum size limit. This action will improve as the water continues to warm. The protected inlets are also giving up some fish, although they are mostly small right now.

Croaker are here, and plenty are coming from the local nets. It won't be long before hook and line catches are the norm. In the meantime, surf and local pier anglers are content with bailing Taylor bluefish, which are averaging around 12-inches.

Even with new species to target, folks are taking advantage of the recent tautog rage. Bait is now more accessible, and fish are hitting well on most offshore and nearshore structures. Respectable fish, with many pushing into the teens, are readily taking offerings, with the top action occurring on blue crabs. Several tog trips have resulted in several dozen hooked fish, with some brutes pushing to well over 15-pounds lately.

Lower Bay and coastal structures are also showing in increase in momentum this week, with good catches of fish ranging to around 5-pounds taking clams, frozen fiddlers, and frozen green crabs. This trend will end abruptly for anglers at the end of the month when the season closes.

Speckled trout action is still worth a look, but most are not interested. The folks at Ocean's East 2 report that the bite is very inconsistent in the Elizabeth river, with some anglers hooking over 30-fish on one day, and less than a handful the next. Twitch baits are still working, with top water plugs becoming more effective this week. The live bait anglers in the Cove are mostly giving up as this bite has slowed to a crawl, but those casting from the banks of the discharge area still getting into a few nice fish. A few fish are still coming from Lynnhaven and Rudee Inlets, but most folks are finding it difficult to get past the puppy drum in these areas. Puppy drum are becoming very active in most any inlet or skinny water location, where both top water lures and Gulp grubs are working well.

The deep dropping interest off the Virginia coast is still good. When the weather allows, boats are loading up on good catches of blueline tilefish, golden tilefish, black bellied rosefish, and a variety of grouper. Offshore activity is beginning to heat up off of Carolina, which is showing promise for a good year for deepwater trollers.

**Delaware Action**

**Updated: April 5, 2013**

**DELAWARE BAY** The rockfish bite seems to have cooled in the lower Delaware River and since it never was hot this means very few of these fish were caught. Those that were landed hit bloodworms fished on the bottom.

The white perch bite did improve in the river and tidal creeks. Once again bloodworms make the best bait with grass shrimp a close second.

A few big catfish have been landed by folks soaking bloodworms for rock. Fish to ten pounds were reported from Reedy Point down to Woodland Beach.

Tog fishing should turn on in the lower bay as soon as the wind drops out. The water temperature is above the lower limit for tog so a few warm, calm days will get this fishery underway.

**INDIAN RIVER INLET** While the inlet failed to produce any fish over the weekend, we could see some action on flounder and hickory shad in the near future. All we need is a few more degrees

of water temperature to get both species in a feeding mood.

**SURF FISHING** Still nothing from the beach and don't expect to see much action for a few more weeks. Rockfish are moving up to their spawning grounds and won't be back down until the spawn is complete.

**INSHORE OCEAN** The head and charter boat captains I spoke with said they had tog over the weekend, but not very many. The bite was slow with a few fish in excess of ten pounds landed. One angler had his second 17 pounder in two weeks.

**EARLY FLOUNDER** It won't be long before the flounder season gets underway and I for one am chaffing at the bit. I was spoiled last year when we caught flounder in late March while this year we have not seen the first fish and it is early April.

Early season flounder are caught from shallow water because this is the area that reaches the optimum water temperature first. The sun will warm the water on high tide and when this water begins to move out on the ebb flounder will begin to feed. Areas with a black mud bottom are especially good during this time.

The Lewes and Rehoboth Canal and Broadkill River are two locations where early flounder are caught. I have taken flounder up as far as Oyster Rocks in the Broadkill River and back as far as the King's Highway Bridge in the canal. At Indian River the flounder will be on the flats between South Shore Marina and Massey's Ditch. I have also caught flounder as far up the bay as Oak Orchard.

Many of these areas are only accessible on high tide and then only with a shallow draft boat. When the water is clear it is easy to see bottom so a little stealth fishing is necessary.

I use the electric motor on my 16-foot Starcraft and raise my gas engine clear of the water. This allows me to control the drift without creating too much noise. When it is time to make a new drift I use the electric motor to get the boat to deep water then employ the gas engine to make the move. Never run a gas engine at speed through shallow water.

I have found live minnows make the best bait in the spring. I fish mine without any weight because the water is so shallow the baitfish can find the bottom unassisted. If I use an artificial, it will be a small bucktail or jig with a minnow or strip of squid. Frozen shiners also work well in the spring, but do require some weight to reach the bottom.

Keep in mind we will be fishing under the 2012 flounder regulations of an 18-inch minimum size and four-fish bag limit until the new regulations for 2013 are made in

early May. Also remember that herring are off limits for bait.

## Tips and Tackle

### Spring Start-up Checklist

Spring has sprung—and for millions of boaters in the U.S. that means it's time to take their boats out of winter storage and put them in the water. For boaters, annual preparation and cleaning projects are necessary rites of spring that help to ensure not only their protection and safety, but also to prevent problems that could keep them off the water once the season is underway.

Discover Boating has put together general guidelines for pre-season boat preparation; get ready for your spring launch by reviewing these six key areas of maintenance. (Be sure to consult your owner's manual for maintenance instructions specific to your boat model.)

#### FUEL SYSTEM

Inspect the fuel system for leaks or damage; pay special attention to fuel hoses, connections and tank surfaces. Evidence of damaged fuel hoses includes softness, brittleness or cracking. Replace components when necessary and verify all fittings and clamps are properly secured. Ensure the engine, exhaust and ventilation systems are all functioning properly

#### ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

Inspect all electrical connections for cleanliness and tightness—corrosion is often a sign a connection may not be safe. To prepare electrical connections for the summer, remove the terminals and use a wire brush to clean them, along with all cable ends. Charge your battery and have it tested to ensure it can hold a charge. Electrical systems should be regularly inspected by a qualified technician

#### BELTS, CABLES & HOSES

Belts, cables and hoses are important to check, as they can become brittle and may crack during winter storage. Belts should fit tightly around pulleys to prevent slipping; a worn belt may have a black substance near the pulley and will fit loosely. Cracks or swells on the outer jacket of control cables may be a sign you have to take immediate action

#### FLUID LEVELS

Check all fluid levels including engine oil, power steering, power trim reservoirs, and coolant. Be sure to change the engine oil, oil filter, and drive lubricants, if these tasks were not done prior to winterizing your boat.

#### PROPELLERS & HULLS

Inspect propellers for dings, pitting, cracks and distortion. Damaged propellers can cause unwanted vibration and damage to

your drive train. Make sure the propeller is secured properly, and replace bearings when needed. When inspecting the hull, look for blisters, distortions and cracks. Be sure to clean the hull, deck, and topsides using an environmentally safe cleaning solution. And, make sure the drain plug is securely in place before every launch.

#### SAFETY GEAR

Check your life jackets to ensure they are in good condition and that there are enough on board for all potential passengers. It's important to ensure that each individual has the correct size life jacket for their body weight. Be sure all onboard fire extinguishers are the correct class for your vessel, and are fully charged and stowed in the proper place. Take advantage of any safety inspections offered by the US Coast Guard (USCG), USCG Auxiliary or US Power Squadrons.

## DNR in the News

### DNR Revamps Volunteer Angler Survey

Maryland's online [Volunteer Angler Survey](#) now has a new look, an added fish species and great prizes! The Maryland Department of Natural Resources (DNR) developed the new and improved survey to be more user-friendly, gather additional information and offer incentives to those who participate.

"Over the past 10 years the survey has been in place, volunteer anglers have provided information that is crucial in analyzing fish populations. For some species, this survey is the only source of information on released and discarded fish, we really can't gather this information any other way," said Dr. Linda Barker, DNR recreational fishing data coordinator.

The Northern Snakehead joins Striped Bass, Summer Flounder, Yellow Perch, Bluefish, Smallmouth Bass, Largemouth Bass, Muskellunge, Blue Crabs, catfish, Crappie, Bluegill, White Perch and Pickerel in the survey. Angler catch information helps fishery managers make harvest, stocking, conservation and restoration decisions.

"We are especially interested in using the survey to track the expanding range of the snakehead population and we want to know the proportion of anglers who like to eat them," said Dr. Joe Love of the DNR Tidal Bass Program.

Anglers who participate in the surveys have the chance to win prizes such as \$100 gift cards from Bass Pro Shops. DNR will randomly draw the winners at the end of the year. All participants who submitted a survey starting January 1, 2013 will be eligible.

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

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
